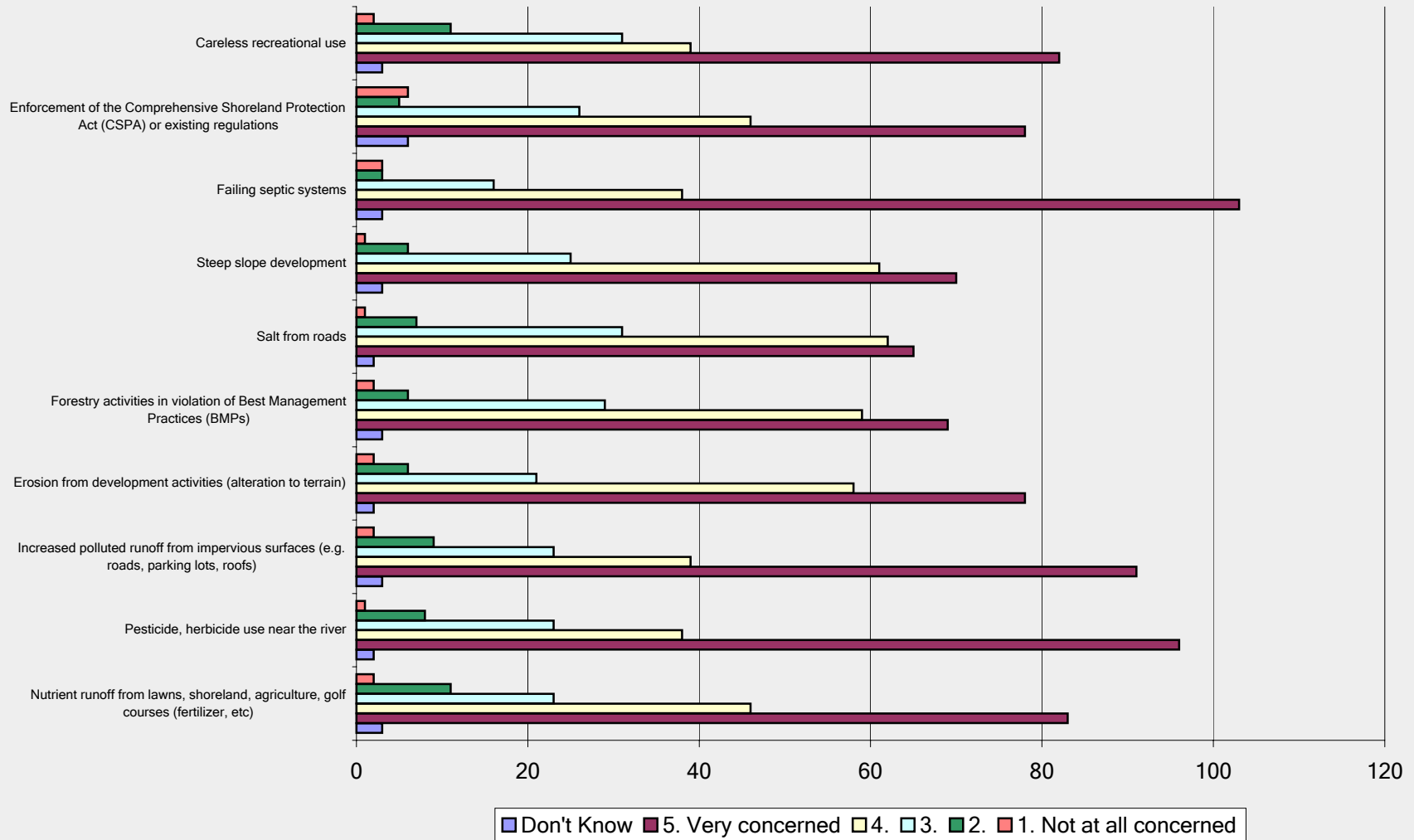

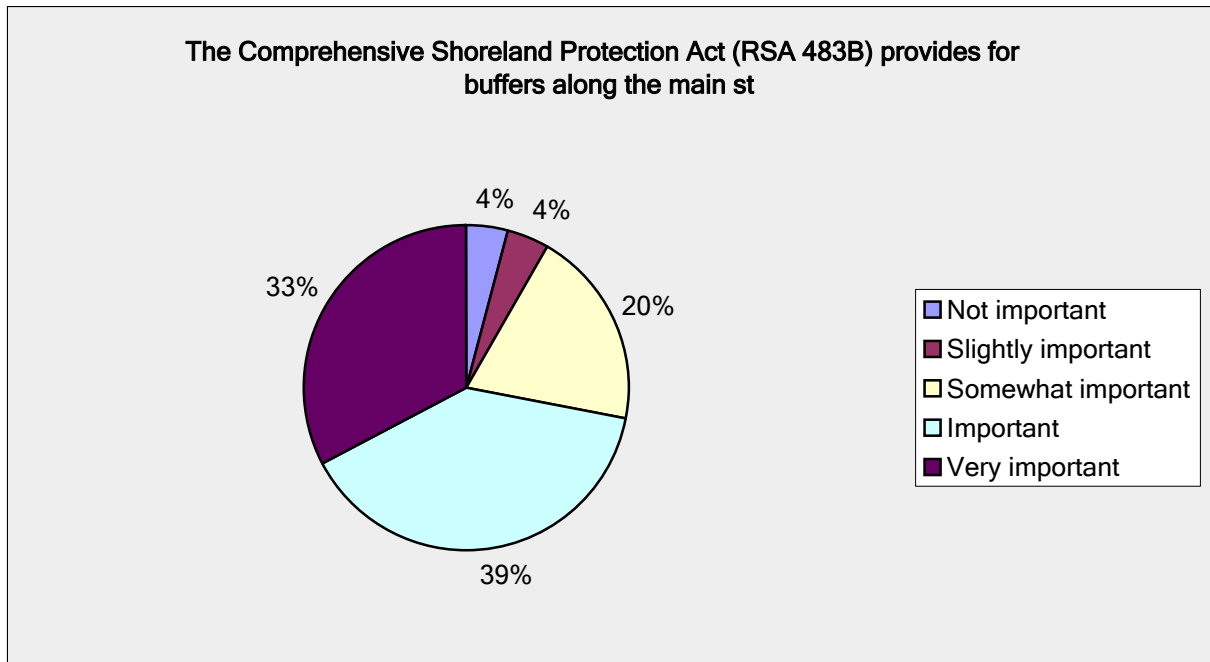

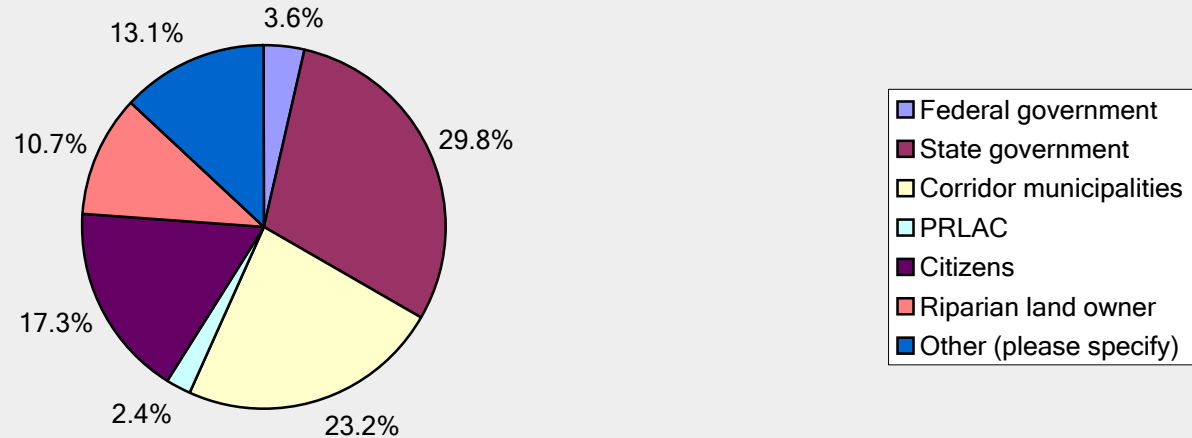

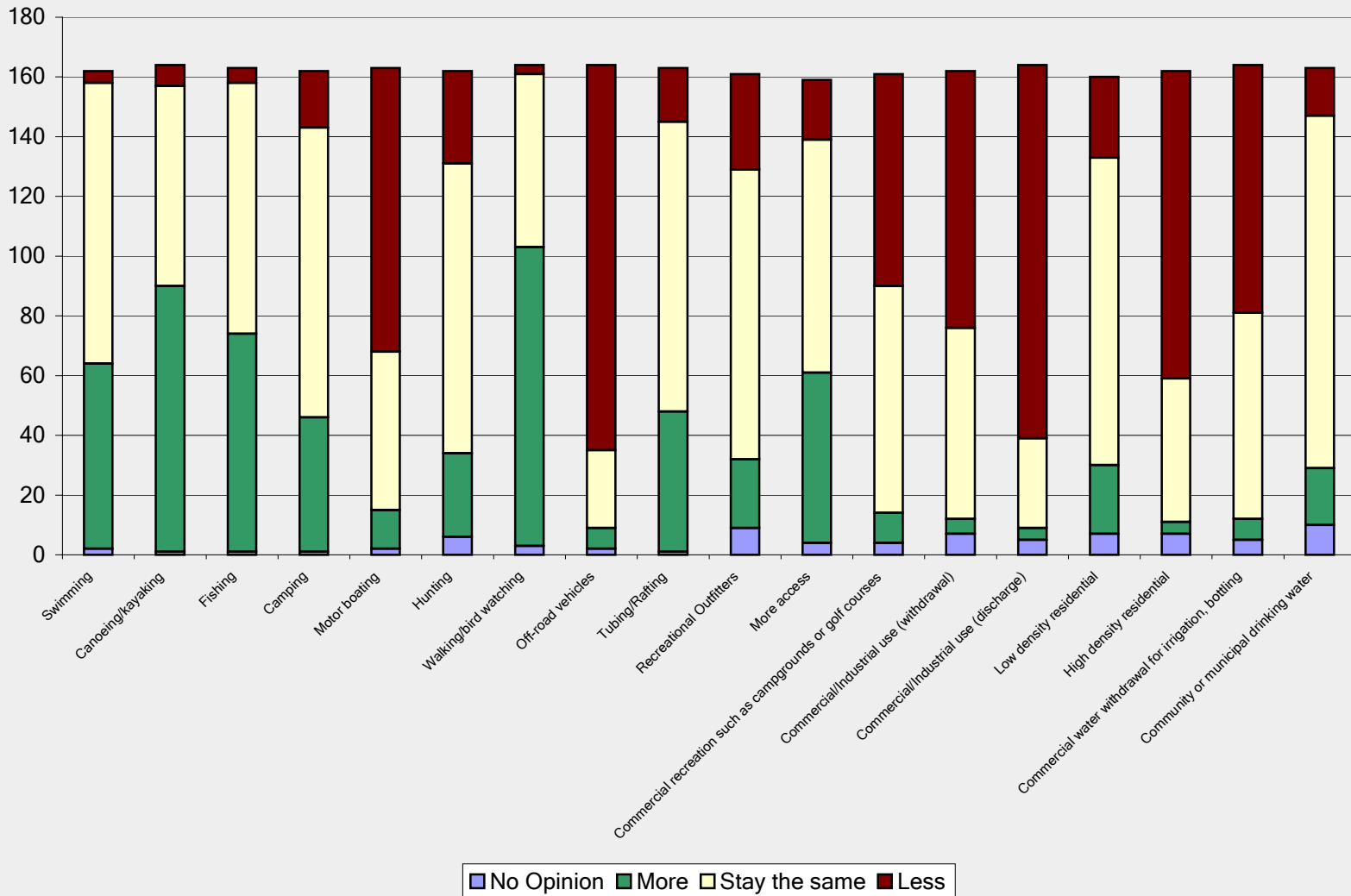
In your opinion, who SHOULD BE most responsible for maintaining water quality in the Pemi?

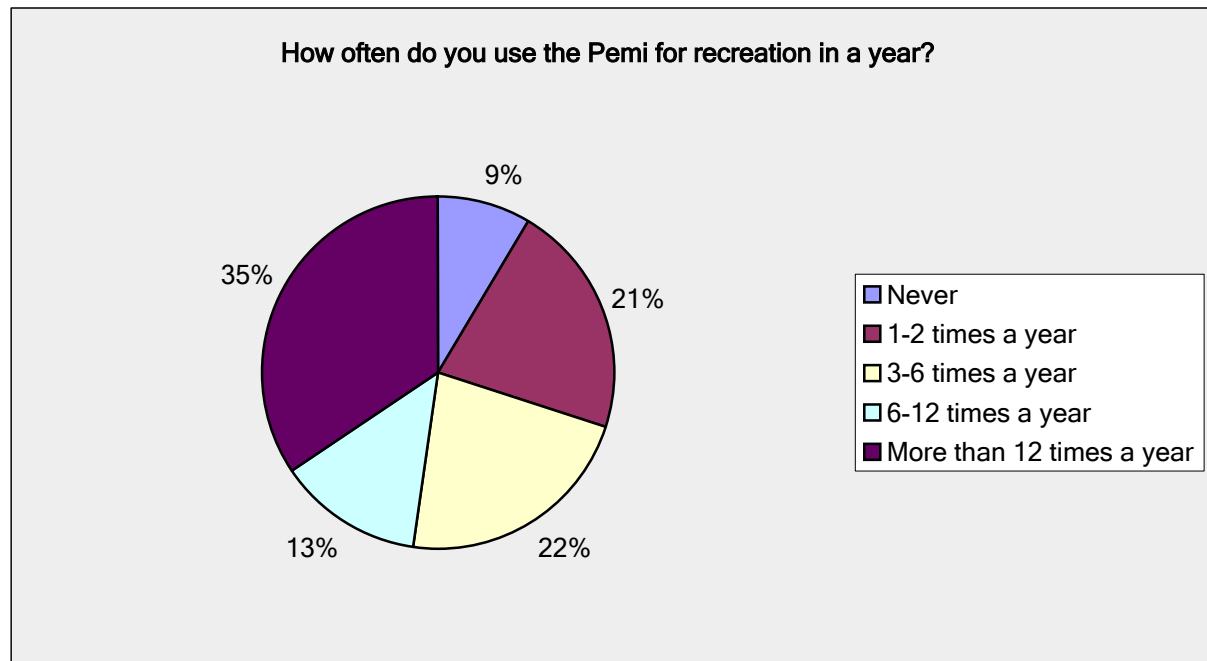
What level of use do you support for the river and its shorelands?

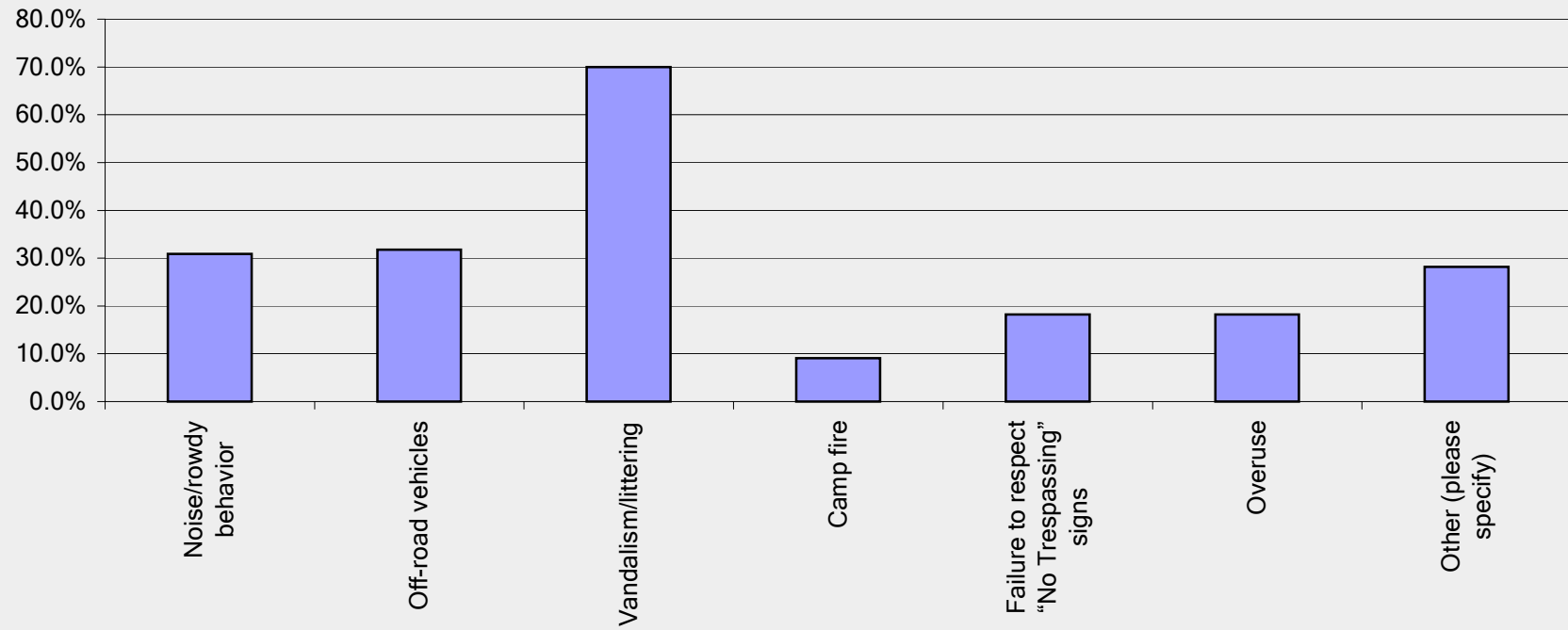

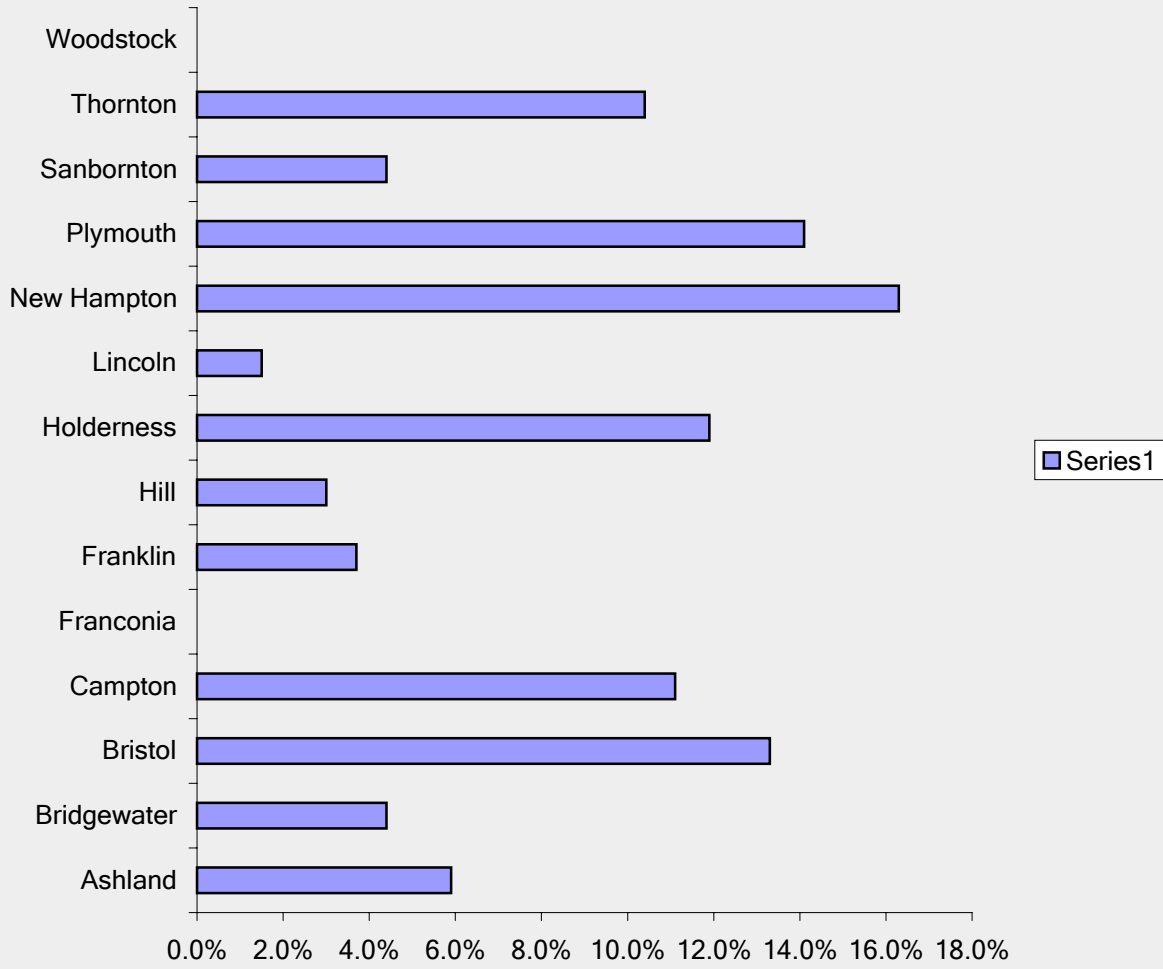

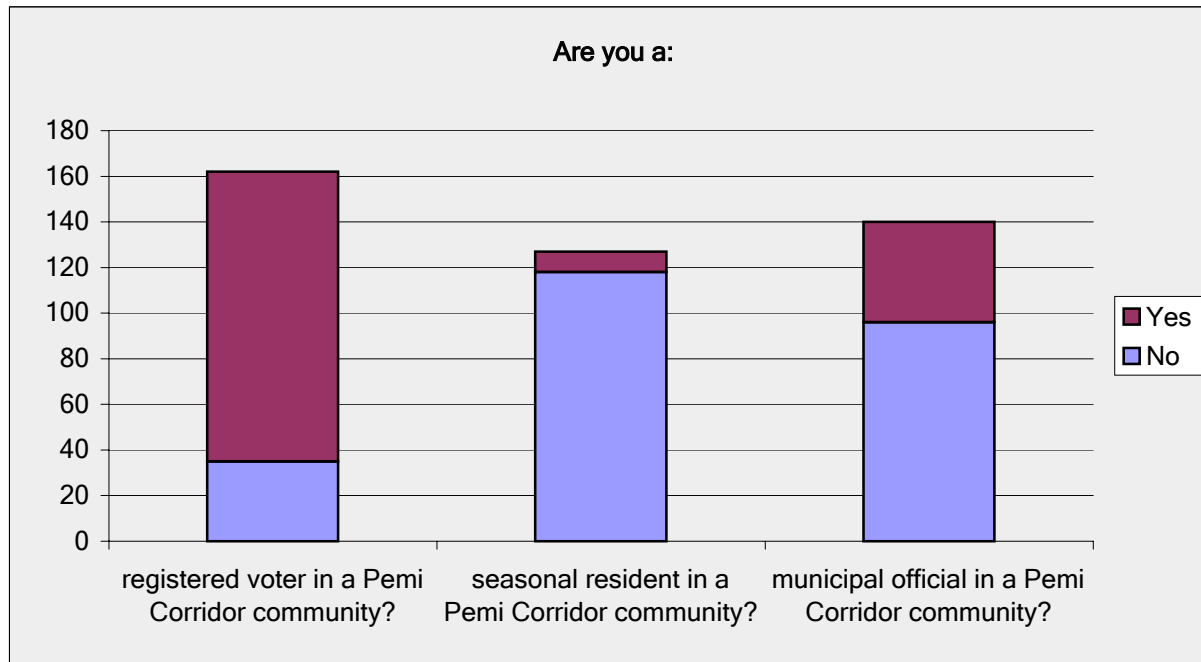

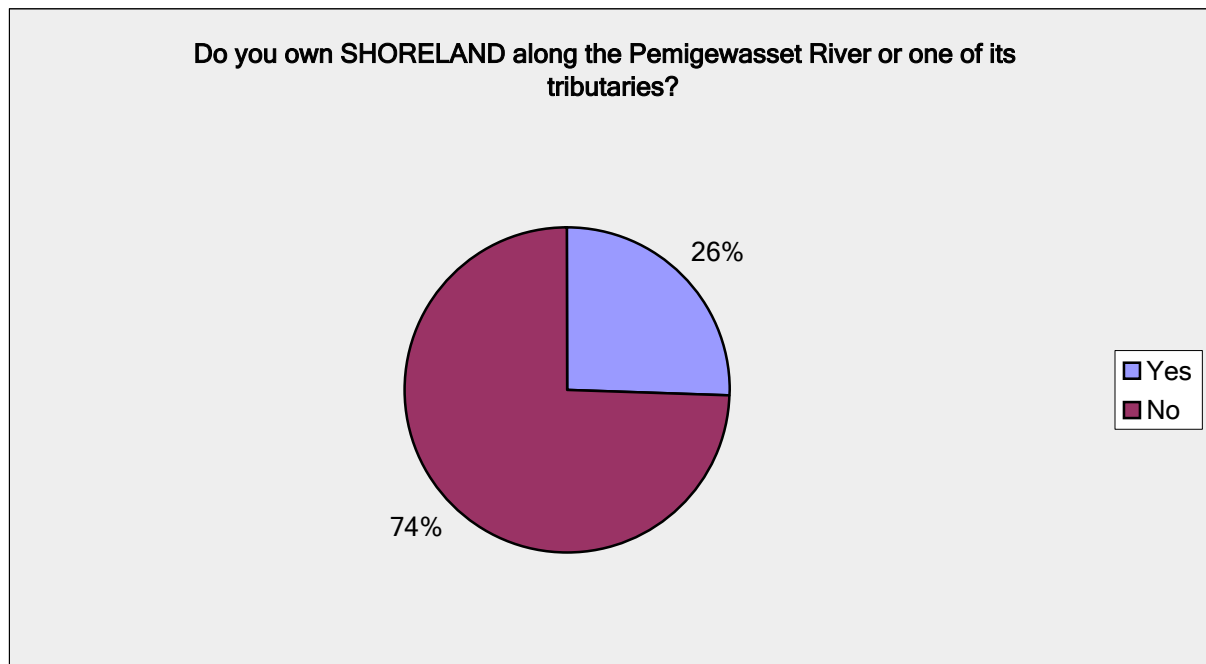

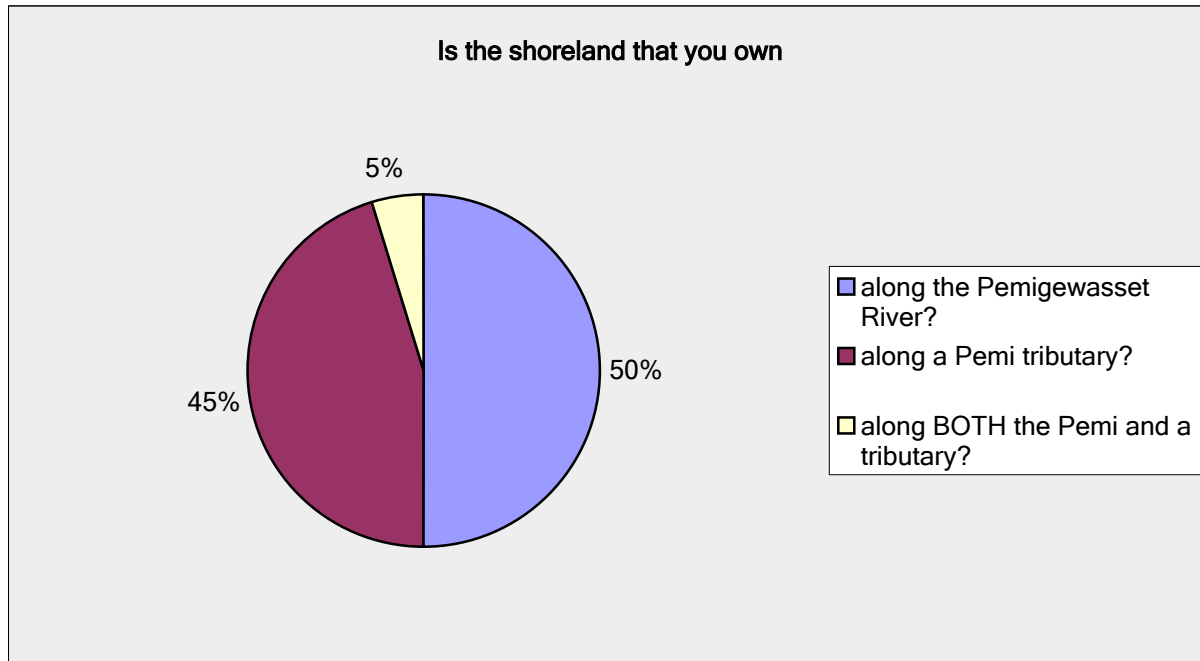
Do you own SHORELAND along the Pemigewasset River or one of its tributaries?

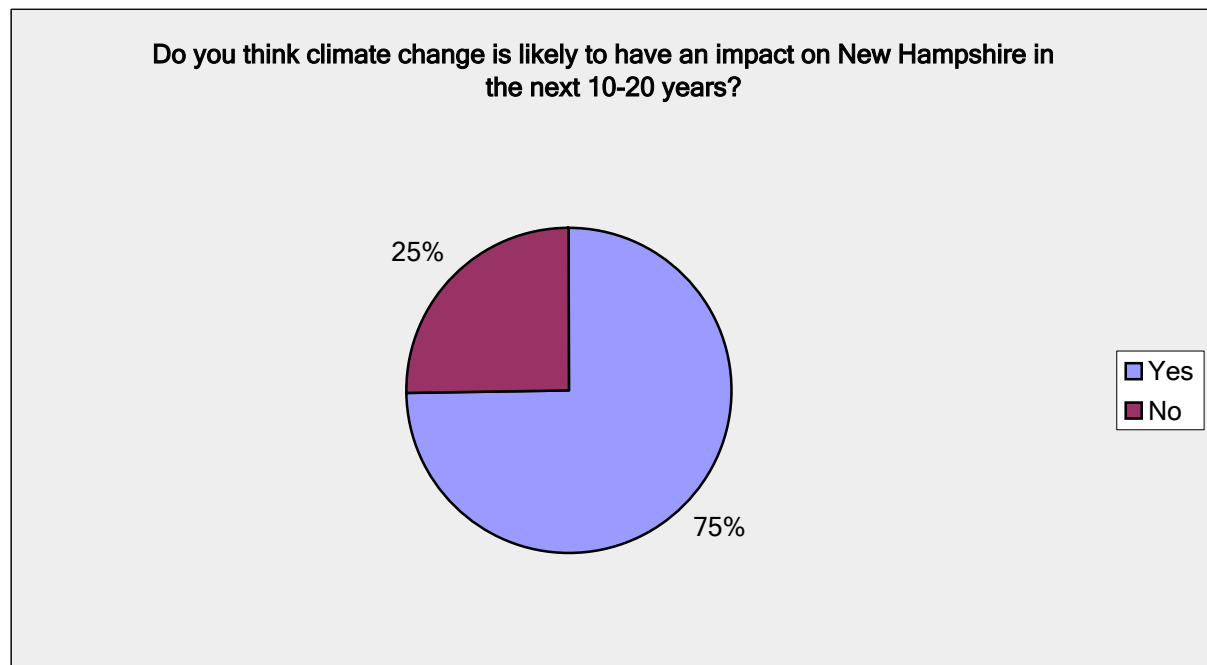

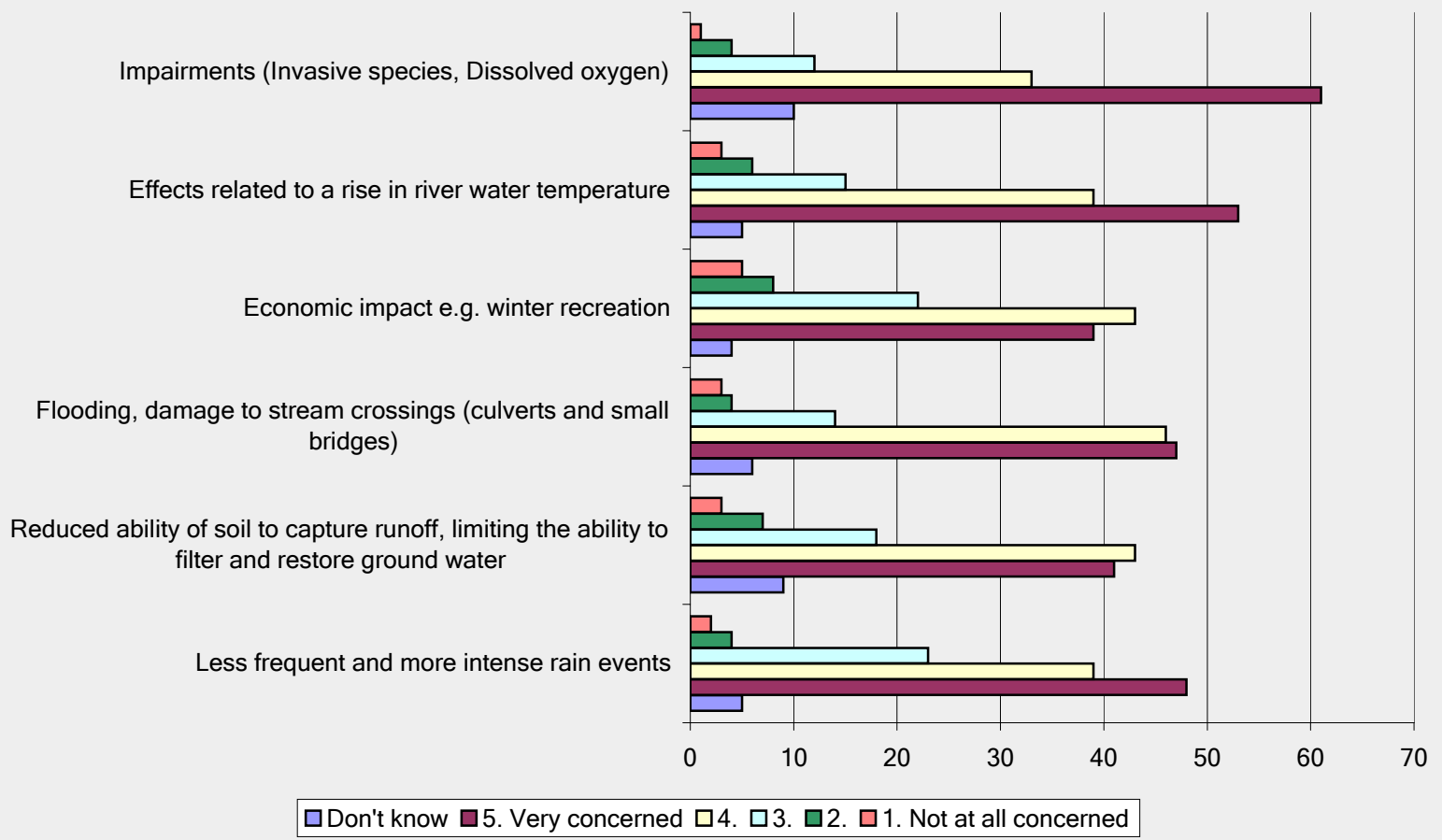

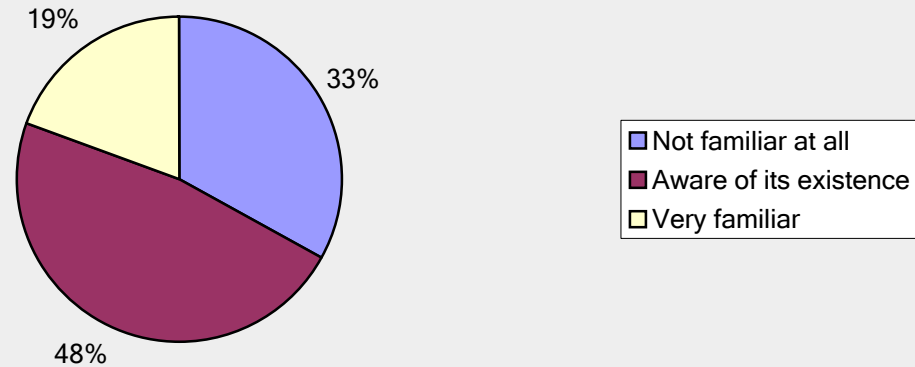

How familiar are you with the activities and goals of the Pemigewasset River Local Advisory Committee (PRLAC)?

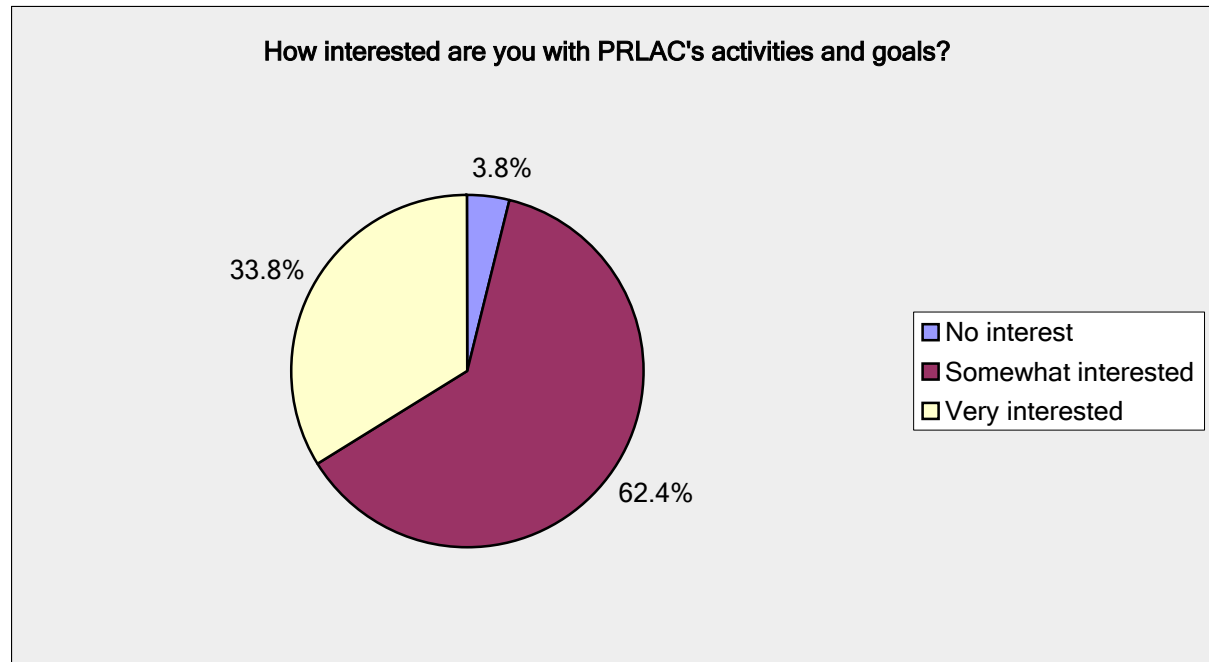
